Board of Trustees Report- *Rob Hecimovich*

The trustee board was responsible for the fiscal health of LWC. In 2025, we increased building use fees; updated the key policy; addressed office administration duties/hours in the absence of a pastor; set standard stipends for sound board volunteers; revamped designated funds to reduce accountant fees and open up funds for other uses; created an overnight parking policy and a list of future maintenance expenses; security policy was reviewed to create a safer environment; conducted a special congregational meeting to adopt new constitution/bylaw structure; collaborated with elders to revamp current trustee list of responsibilities and tasks to accommodate the new structure.

The year proved to be one of challenges and growth, trials and successes, but in the end we have turned the corner into a new year with a new structure, with anticipation of a new pastor and a new direction according to God's will.

Awana- *Darla Perry*

A global leader in child discipleship, Awana equips leaders to shape lasting faith, reaching more than 8,654,933 million kids in 91,702 churches across 140 countries. The Awana Clubs' mission is to share

the Gospel message to children worldwide whether it be in churches or through the African Public School Initiative.

In February, we sent two all-girl teams with seven kids total to Awana Bible Quizzing tournament to compete against 12 other teams represented by eight other churches all over Southern Wisconsin. Our 3-person team came away with 1st place while our four-person team grabbed 3rd place in the team events. We also had an individual quizzier who placed 3rd overall in the individual event. In March, we sent five Sparks (K-2) and 14 T&T (3rd grade - 6th grade) clubbers to the Awana Games. Our teams competed against six other churches. Our Sparks Team, combined with Bethany Church, won 3rd place. Our FIRST EVER T&T team of 14 clubbers and two coaches took 1st place overall. We were super excited to celebrate the accomplishments of all 75 children and the commitment of 24 volunteers during our Awards Night in May.

On our opening night on September 16, 2025, our registration was an incredible 84 kids and 20 volunteers!! God is at work and speaking into the hearts of each child through the memorization of scripture, music, prayer and Bible stories.

Care Ministry- *Deb Parks*

We provided meals to several from our Living Water family. Many surgeries and long-term illnesses gave opportunities to bless them with meals. We had plenty of volunteers to provide these, but we are always looking for people willing to make a meal for someone in need.

Card Ministry- *Yvonne Disch*

Cards were sent for birthdays and anniversaries. The office also sent out thank you notes to our first-time Sunday visitors.

Children's Ministry- *Cheryl Holloway*

Flood Zone

Flood Zone children continued their journey through the Bible striving to align the Sunday School teaching with the congregational teaching. Life application is emphasized with all lessons. During the seasons of Lent, Easter, Advent and Thanksgiving, special emphasis programs were held. Four classes were offered on Sunday mornings

(P/K, 1st/2nd/3rd, 4th/5th and upper levels). Grades 3 and above started journaling each Sunday to reflect on how the lesson applies to their lives. Children volunteers lead the 'release prayer' before dismissal for Sunday School. With a potential of 41 students (20 families), attendance ranged from 19-30 students each Sunday.

Special outreach activities were the Souper Bowl of Caring (with soup and cash collected for the Little Food Pantry), Lenten prayer bowls, a communion table covering with painted crosses from ashes, 25th Anniversary activities, weekly Advent ornaments, Family Advent Bags, coloring contest and a scratch art contest.

Going forward into 2026, we will continue to look for opportunities to equip parents to lead faith formation within the home setting as well as to seek ways to reach out to the congregation. Outreach activities provide opportunities for serving others while living out our faith.

God has so richly blessed us with great teachers and helpers who serve so faithfully in our LWC Children's Ministry. Four very dedicated volunteers left Living Water this year, but God blessed us with two new helpers who were 'ready' to teach God's Word to the children. To do what God has called us to do, more volunteers are always needed. We are excited and wait in anticipation to see where God will lead us in 2026.

Activity Bags

Located in the back of the Sanctuary, bags were available for children who do not attend Sunday School. Books, coloring sheets, puzzles and other activities were included in the bags. Special bags with Christmas story books and activities were available for Christmas services.

Vacation Bible School

It was a great week for outreach into the community with 54 of the 82 attendees attending from outside of Living Water Church. The five-day program was held August 3-7, 5:45-8:15 pm. Students explored the theme "Surprised by God" through the stories of Elijah and the Ravens, the Writing on the Wall, Feeding of the 5000, Mary's Journey and Paul and Silas. Our key verse was "No eye has seen, no ear has heard, and no mind has imagined what God has prepared for those who love him." (I Corinthians 2:9)

Nightly sessions provided: music, art, story, class time, snack/rec and activity. Daily tokens served as a take home reminder to keep parents informed of the daily themes. A Thursday evening program recapped the week's activities. Participants were encouraged to bring items for the Little Food Pantry during the week.

Nothing just happens. Countless hours of prep work went into planning and construction. Sixty-five volunteers involved in all phases of VBS show what God can do when God's people work together. Truly this was a week where we were 'surprised' by God.

Safe Environment

Living Water strives to create a safe environment for all people. Training was offered in the areas of child protection, understanding and responding to abuse, protective behaviors, safe leadership and safe environments. This training was required for everyone working with children and strongly encouraged for all other volunteers. Gaining this vital knowledge in these areas protects not only all those that we are ministering to BUT protects our volunteers from false accusations. Classes were scheduled as needed.

Nursery

The nursery, for babies – 3 years old, is open during second service. It is staffed with two volunteers who have been trained in the safe environment program and nursery procedures. Volunteers in the nursery could watch the live-streamed service. Thank you to those who volunteer. Though with the loss of six volunteers this year, our goal continued to be to have nursery care during the second service. Our goal is to provide nursery care during first service next year.

Decorating Committee- Jenni Freitag

We maintained church décor as the seasons changed. Many hands made light work for Christmas decorating after church on the Sunday before Thanksgiving. All the volunteers were SUCH a blessing!

Next year we hope to paint the Sunday School rooms, add scriptures to those walls, add vinyl stencils above the wooden globe in the foyer and create a visual point of interest on the platform in the sanctuary.

The Great Commission- *Marge Tudor*

The Great Commission Committee at Living Water Church is dedicated to fulfilling Christ's call to outreach by intentionally engaging our community with the message of the Gospel. Our mission is to create welcoming opportunities for individuals to encounter Jesus Christ, learn about the ministry of Living Water Church, and experience meaningful connection within our faith community.

Throughout 2025, the committee met monthly to pray, plan, and brainstorm ways to support outreach efforts that invite people into the life of the church. Through events, hospitality and community engagement, the Great Commission Committee sought to extend Christ's love beyond our walls and into the surrounding neighborhood.

Community Garage Sale

The congregation was invited to donate items then we welcomed the neighborhood to participate. Shoppers filled bags for a \$5 donation. Over \$1,000 was raised to support our Summer Fun Nights Ministry. This event successfully brought the community onto our campus while directly supporting our summer outreach program.

Bring a Friend Sunday

Members were encouraged to invite friends, family, and neighbors to worship and fellowship at Living Water Church. Invitational flyers were distributed throughout the neighborhood. Visitors were welcomed and provided opportunities for meaningful fellowship within the congregation: Build-a-Sundae Sunday, Build-a-Potato Sunday, Build-a-Macaroni Bowl Sunday, Build-a-Brat Sunday with Q&A.

Advent Season

The focus was on outreach opportunities that invited families to bring friends, neighbors and loved ones to experience the joy and purpose of Christmas through four special events: Hanging of the Greens, our church decorating event to prepare for Christmas, followed by a pizza lunch; Christmas "Mug Shot" Fellowship- attendees enjoyed hot chocolate, cookies and festive photos by the Christmas tree; Crafts, Carols and Comfort Food- an evening of soup, sandwiches, crafts, laughter and caroling; Purpose and Promise of Christmas- movie

night showing of *The Nativity Story* complete with popcorn and Christmas crafts.

25th Anniversary Celebration

We celebrated 25 years since our formation and 20 years in our current building. On May 18, more than 300 people gathered to worship, reflect and rejoice together. There was an atmosphere of joy, gratitude and celebration as we honored God's faithfulness throughout the years. The presence of all four of our past and present pastors made the occasion especially meaningful, allowing us to celebrate the legacy of leadership that has shaped Living Water Church across generations.

Following a beautiful worship service, all four pastors—past and present—shared reflections, offering encouragement and gratitude.

A fellowship dinner followed.

The 25th Anniversary Team worked diligently to ensure the celebration was meaningful and memorable for all who attended. Tim Lothe created a handcrafted cross for each attendee, symbolizing the unity and shared journey of our church family over the past 25 years. A commemorative booklet was created to highlight the church's history from its beginning through 2025 and featured photographs and memories.

Throughout the month of May, on exhibit was a historical display featuring photographs, newspaper clippings, plaques and memorabilia that reflected our rich history.

As a fundraiser, 25th Anniversary commemorative coffee mugs were sold. Additionally, engraved bricks for the Legacy Garden were available to purchase to support and beautify this space. Tim Lothe will engrave the bricks in 2026 to bring the garden to completion.

We give thanks for the past, celebrate the present, and look forward with hope to the future!

As we move into 2026, the Great Commission Committee will continue to support and expand hospitality team activities, with a focus on welcoming newcomers, strengthening community connections and creating inviting environments where faith can grow.

Grounds and Landscape Maintenance- *Duane Sanner*

Grounds and landscape maintenance at Living Water Church is a year-round effort. The summer ground crew kept busy with mowing, trimming, maintenance of the shrubs and flowers, weed removal around the flower and shrubs of the teardrop boulevard north of the church, the circle lot by the apartments at the northeast corner of the church lot, the playground, the landscape around the church building, the lawns and the mulching areas (power boxes). The four ash trees in the circle lot were treated to prevent ash borer issues. Grounds maintenance for the church usually takes approximately 8-12 hours per week.

This year a nitrogen generation unit for the fire suppression system was installed. This revealed that five fire suppression lines in the attic have leaks causing the pump to run for several hours a day. Steps will be taken in 2026 to repair the lines. The nitrogen generator pump was mounted to a wall in the fire room and created a lot of noise. That unit will be moved to help prevent the sound issue.

The playground had an incident of vandalism causing damage to the shrub line south of the playground. The playground is maintained by the church and when open, used by the Providence community and the residents of Sun Prairie.

Snow and ice removal of the parking lot and residential sidewalks was completed by an outside contractor. The grounds crew maintains the sidewalk and steps immediately around the church. We are always looking for people to help clear the sidewalks after snowstorms.

Ongoing small maintenance projects continued to be handled to include monitoring the emergency lights, monitoring the fire extinguishers, maintaining the back stairs and entryway, changing out of the air filters on the HVAC systems and repairing down spouts. The inside lighting and plumbing issues were maintained by volunteers. Additional cameras were installed to cover certain areas of the inside of the church. This program needs further refinement to ensure all aspects of the church's property is properly monitored.

Suggested 2026 Projects: rebuilding of the church sign (located on the north side of the church); install a motion-activated light to illuminate the dumpster area.

Thanks to all of our volunteers for maintaining our building and grounds. Additional help is always needed

Local Missions

Little Food Pantry- Carol Bethel, In mid-year we had a lot of vandalism by several local kids. After catching them on video and explaining to them that the pantry was to feed people in need, the vandalism stopped.

Living Water was able to provide much needed nutritious food to our neighbors and saw an increase in area residents giving to the Little Pantry. This was one of our goals in the beginning.

In 2026, the pantry will get much needed repairs, paint and a general deep cleaning.

We praise God for His abundance and thank you for your support of the Little Pantry in 2025. An extra thank you to VBS and AWANA for their food drives this year. It made a BIG difference!

As you do your grocery shopping in 2026, remember Little Pantry and the donation basket under Connection Point in the narthex.

Summer Fun Nights- Deb Parks, On Tuesday fun nights, held once a month in June, July and August, we took over the LWC grounds and invited our neighbors for hot dogs, brats, popcorn, snow cones, cole slaw, chips, ice cream. There was music, crafts, bingo, games, bouncy house, face painting and great conversations. Our goal is to continue these fun nights, to love on our neighbors and have fun as a church family. The June night had the highest attendance, so we are considering making the August night an all-church picnic.

Fall Fun Night- Deb Parks, What started as a Halloween alternative has taken on its own flavor. It was an old-fashioned game night (many homemade) to bring in neighborhood families to have some fun. It was so refreshing to see adults and kids playing together. We had chili, corn bread, bouncy house, face painting, pumpkin painting and games. We are often thanked many times by our neighbors, especially for the Fall Fun Night.

Men of Fire - Men's Ministry- *Tim Awes*

We are men seeking fellowship with other men who yearn for God's wisdom through His Word. We met every 2nd and 4th Saturday (January-October and second Saturdays in November and December) for breakfast and wisdom through a lesson and discussion. Coffee is on at 7:00am, breakfast served at 7:30am, Biblical lesson/discussion 8:00am-9:00am.

2025 Highlights:

Participated in the annual No Regrets Men's Conference hosted at City Church, on the 1st Saturday of February where we helped with facilitating breakout sessions, the prayer room and ushering duties. We helped some parishioners move across town, hosted spring and fall workdays and helped move items around LWC grounds.

Prayer Ministry- *Maureen Formisano*

Altar and Service pray-ers prayed before, during and after services. Barb Struckmeyer led in this area with 14 volunteers. Two training sessions were held. More copies of Prayer Ministry by Paul Anderson were ordered.

Tuesday Morning Intercessory Prayer Group, 10-12 in attendance, met weekly via zoom from 9:00am-10:00am to pray over requests from Connection Cards, prayer chain, website requests and personal requests. An effort was made to follow up on prayer request recipients.

The Gathering (Acts 2:42), Wednesday night prayer, 10-16 in attendance, met weekly from 6:30pm-7:30pm. We asked the Holy Spirit to guide our prayers, testimonies and singing. Follow-ups were made on prayer requests.

Prayer Breakfast: We had two prayer breakfasts. January 18th, "Under Construction from the Inside Out- God's Way" where prayer team members spoke about the fruit of the Spirit, with 21 in attendance. July 8th, Steve Freitag, executive director of

CrossCounsel International Ministries, spoke about how to handle conflict within the church, with 40 people in attendance.

Prayer Chain: 53 praying individuals covered prayer requests via email. Requests were gathered from Connection cards, emails, the website and by phone.

Community Prayer Opportunities: On April 30th, the eve of National Day of Prayer, we gathered to pray for our nation. Several people attended the State Capital event the next day.

After the tragic death of Mary Nagatz in July, the prayer team purchased a brick as a lasting memory of all she did her 25 years at LWC.

In September, we had our first combined prayer and worship night. It was well received and we plan to continue monthly in 2026.

Prayer Shawl Ministry- *Liz Schlagenhaft*

After more than ten years, this ministry still had a dedicated group who knitted and crocheted shawls and blankets for those who need to feel God's love, for solace, comfort, healing or celebration. Our meeting time was changed to 1:30pm-3pm, every 1st and 3rd Monday. Everyone was welcome to join as we have plenty of yarn and time to teach how to. We made over 50 shawls, so please take one to someone in need.

Sheepdog Ministry / Security Committee- *Caleb Carr*

The Sheepdog Ministry found itself gearing up to provide a more safe and secure place of worship in the coming year. We look forward to implementing teams of regular security members that will keep watch over our building and family during services. We will be using more cameras and enhanced doorbells. Although volunteers and equipment are minimal, we continue to strive to do our best to maintain a safe place to gather and worship with our friends and family.

Women's Ministry- Lyn Koenig

February- *You-niquely Created*, 22 attended

April- *God's Lavish Abundance*, 20 attended

August- *Garden & Gab*, 13 attended

October- *And Jesus Saw Her*, annual women's retreat 13 attended

December- *Jesus IS the Light of the World*, Christmas, 65 attended

Women's Ministry purchased sixty seat pockets for sanctuary chairs and purchased food for the luncheon with the pastor candidate in November. Gifted 8 moms, 16 children, 12 staff and 10 volunteers at Shelter From the Storm Ministries for Christmas. Purchased 100 Lent devotional booklets for the congregation to Lent together. After serving six years as women's ministry leader, Lyn Koenig resigned at the end of 2025.

Worship Arts/Worship Tech- Robert Rockman

Worship Arts: While this position remained open, we had a rotation of worship leaders that took on the duties of scheduling teams and leading worship each week. We started using different functions in PC for roadmaps as well as reminder emails. The worship team held the first prayer and worship night in October 2025 and intend to do so monthly in 2026. God has faithfully provided dedicated volunteers every Sunday morning, making the worship experience at LWC rich and vibrant.

Worship/tech- Robert Rockman

This position also remained open but new volunteers stepped forward in 2025 to run sound and slides. There was training on the lighting system which was recorded for future reference, and this allowed for some great lights during VBS as well as variation during regular services.

In 2026:

Constitution/Bylaw Committee- Bruce Fischer

What started as a simple review of our constitution and bylaws back in 2024 blossomed into a full-blown rewrite in 2025. Our committee spent many hours reviewing other church's bylaws, looking at best practices and discussing how our proposed changes would work in a practical sense. We chose to use consensus, rather than a vote, to

resolve issues: if we could not agree, we tabled the topic until we could do further research, consider other options or ideas and discuss again. We concluded and believe this will enhance communication, provide greater accountability and transparency, streamlined decision-making and unity and provide a life-giving model for our congregation to carry us into the future. The committee was extremely pleased with the overwhelming support of the congregation as the proposals passed by a very wide margin. Thanks to the team: Bruce Fischer (chair), Tim Awes, Phil Koenig, Alfred Johnson, Jhansy Kollapudi, Candace Miller, Don Struckmeyer, Janet Tranberg and during the review process Jason Hoffman. This team gave up many nights to provide the best document that we could produce. Thank you for your time and commitment.

Pastoral Search Committee- *Ken Betts*, Under the leadership of our Interim Pastor, Eric Dunkin, we had our first meeting on Feb 06, 2025. Except for a 4-week break in March while the congregation examined a merger with New Crossings Church, we met almost every Monday night through the last year. We reviewed over 50 applications and initiated further contact with over half of them. In our initial meetings, we set up the criteria, qualifications and characteristics we would be looking at for the senior pastor of our church. Many of these were included in our job description which we posted on church staffing sites. We had had some candidates that we thought very highly of who withdrew along the process (often due to accepting a position elsewhere or a change in their own decision process) and others that we elected not to pursue further after 2 or 3 online interviews. Three candidates got to the stage of in-person meetings. We declined one and two others withdrew at the last stages of the process for personal reasons. We will continue to pursue further candidates in 2026 and believe that this is, indeed, God's process, not ours. He will bring His candidate to us at the appropriate time. We continue to anticipate His guidance in the process.

Our committee changed personnel a little over the last year, but at the end of the year, the members are Ken Betts (Committee Chair), Kyleen Rockman, Anna Gontkovic, Franklin Miller, Thao Sweeney, Nellianne Bergman, and Bruce Fischer (Elder representative).

2025 First Fruits Giving

First Fruits was the title of what had been given to the church through the offerings of the congregation. This helped us to remember that all we have is a gift from God. Each year the Elders determine who will receive our First Fruits offerings.

Called Higher Ministries is a non-profit Christian discipleship organization run by Mike Klenke and Cindy Smith-Klenke. They provide teaching, discipleship programs and services for adults, helping them embrace a Kingdom mindset and lifestyle through their “Cross-Trained for the Kingdom (CTFK)” discipleship programs and other services.

CrossCounsel International Ministries: Steve and Jenni Freitag are part of CrossCounsel International Ministries. CrossCounsel exists to help people position their hearts to receive authentic encounters with God, producing real and lasting freedom, reflecting the true character and nature of Jesus.

Harriet Ngao, African Missions, and her husband Travis, have sacrificed time and money to help build housing, churches, medical centers and schools in Kenya.

Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC) is an association of congregations who are free in Christ, accountable to one another and rooted in the scriptures and the Lutheran confessions, working together to fulfill Christ's great commission to go and make disciples of all nations.

Mission Impact has a passion to reflect the Glory of God in Guatemala through twelve dynamic, nationally lead, long-term ministries that focus on eleven areas of education, health, nutrition, community development, appropriate technology, pastoral training, and spiritual formation through making disciples.

Shelter From the Storm Ministries (SFTSM) is a non-profit Christian organization in Sun Prairie made up of individuals with various religious affiliations who have come together to address the problem of homelessness for single moms and their children.

Sunshine Place in Sun Prairie, is a non-profit organization that delivers food, clothing and necessary services with respect and dignity to individuals, families, and children facing hardship.

TORN Ministries is a non-denominational church located in Portage, WI, led by Pastor Fred Schumacher. Pastor Fred served as our interim pastor prior to Pastor Isaac's arrival in 2016.

YWAM-Bergman, Tim, Nellianne and their children, work with *Youth with a Mission (YWAM)* to train and send out missionaries into the world to spread the good news of Jesus. They also have a focus on training pastors and leaders in nations and locations where there is no access to Biblical education or leadership training.

YWAM-Dharam: Sam and Jennifer are elders with *Youth with a Mission (YWAM)-Asia Pacific* and have traveled all over the world ministering and teaching leadership development.

YWAM-Hanson: Nick and Sophie are serving with YWAM in Bondi, Australia, providing hospitality and pastoral care.

Other Activities

Blood Drives: LWC hosted four blood drives and collected 81 units of blood. We were blessed with new LWC donors, as well.

Building Use: East Wind Ministries and United Hmong Baptist Church continued to meet and use the building throughout the week. The Awana program used both floors on Tuesday nights. Mad City Dancers (line dancers) met on Saturdays. Other uses: Model A Club, YWAM graduation, baby showers, a wedding, a memorial, neighborhood condo association meetings.

Care Net: Our annual Baby Bottle fundraiser took place between Mother's Day and Father's Day to collect money for this local women's resource center.

Dance It Out: A dance fitness class called Dance It Out met on Tuesday mornings and was offered to anyone of any age or fitness level.
